

Lesson 18

Mary and Martha

Luke 10:38-42

Now as they went on their way, Jesus entered a village. And a woman named Martha welcomed him into her house. And she had a sister called Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet and listened to his teaching. But Martha was distracted with much serving. And she went up to him and said, "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me to serve alone? Tell her then to help me." But the Lord answered her, "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and troubled about many things, but one thing is necessary. Mary has chosen the good portion, which will not be taken away from her."



 No context that is crucial to understanding this account – just a beautiful, simple glimpse into a quieter part of Jesus ministry.

Bethany

- Raising of Lazarus
- On the Saturday evening before Palm Sunday, a feast at Simon the Leper's home. Martha served, Lazarus was at the table with Jesus, Marty anointed Jesus' feet with expensive perfume.
- Left Bethany on Palm Sunday morning, returned there in the evening
- Jesus ascended from a hill at Bethany

Friends of Jesus and a place of respite.

And a woman named Martha welcomed him into her house. ³⁹ And she had a sister called Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet and listened to his teaching. ⁴⁰ But Martha was distracted with much serving.

- Mary's service listening, learning, worshipping Jesus
- Martha's service providing for Jesus' earthly needs
- Martha's weakness
 - o Distracted by her service
 - The service itself not wrong, service that is no longer in love and joy is a sin; "doing" that is prioritized over love, devotion, and the Word is a sin.

⁴⁰ But Martha was distracted with much serving. And she went up to him and said, "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me to serve alone? Tell her then to help me."

- What started as joyful service for Jesus, became a point of contention, frustration, and anger—to Mary, and to Jesus, "...do you not care..."

⁴¹ But the Lord answered her, "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and troubled about many things,

- When we are "Martha"
 - o anxious about many things
 - o troubled by many things
 - o cf. the parable of the sower and the seed (seed fallen on thorny ground is choked out the seed takes root, but then the cares and worries of the world choke it out, cf. Matthew 13:1ff)

"Therefore I tell you, do not be anxious about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, nor about your body, what you will put on. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? ²⁶ Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? ²⁷ And which of you by being anxious can add a single hour to his span of life? ²⁸ And why are you anxious about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin, ²⁹ yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. ³⁰ But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which today is alive and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you, O you of little faith? ³¹ Therefore do not be anxious, Martha saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' ³² For the Gentiles seek after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them all. ³³ But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you. Mary "Therefore do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble. (Matthew 6:25-34)

- Martha was so busy *about* Jesus that she forgot to live in Him – to listen to Him, to put Him first

"I know your works, your toil and your patient endurance, and how you cannot bear with those who are evil, but have tested those who call themselves apostles and are not, and found them to be false. I know you are enduring patiently and bearing up for my name's sake, and you have not grown weary. But I have this against you, that you have abandoned the love you had at first. Remember therefore from where you have fallen; repent, and do the works you did at first. (Revelation 2:2-5)

42 but one thing is necessary. Mary has chosen the good portion, which will not be taken away from her."

- One thing is necessary
 - o Salvation from sins
 - o Earthly needs (cf. daily bread)
 - o Earthly struggles, cf. counseling in sorrow, marriage, parenting, being trapped in sin, depression, etc.

"The good portion" (Bread of Life)

"Come, everyone who thirsts,
come to the waters;
and he who has no money,
come, buy and eat!
Come, buy wine and milk
without money and without price.
Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread,
and your labor for that which does not satisfy? (Isaiah 55:1-2)

The best service to Jesus is to have Him serve you. "

The Son of Man came not to be served but to serve and to give His life a ransom for many (Matthew 20:28).

One thing's needful; Lord, this treasure


One thing's needful; Lord, this treasure
